Federal Enrichment Program **Provides SCH Summer Courses**

Although June 10 will mark the final dismissal of classes, the halls of the school will continue to re-echo the sounds of students.

St. Casimir School, along with 16 other non-public schools and 100 public schools in Detroit will take part in the Greater Cities School Project.

The program, administered by the Special Project Division of the Greater Cities Extended School Program, has as its purpose the provision of educational opportunities for Inner-City youths. Financially support-ed by the federal elementary-secondary act, the program is designed to give both remedial and enriching experiences in many sub jects.

Here at St. Casimir School, language arts, mathematics, science and social studies concepts, fine arts, and music will be taught. The classes will be held for six weeks, from June 27-August 5.

Classes will be held for four hours a day, with the students attending a total of 120 hours. The school will be open not only to its own students but to the community. Accommodations are being made for 225 students in 10 classes.

Students will pursue knowledge at their own rate, for the pressure of grades and report cards will not be present. Classes will be held in informal surroundings with few students, allowing teachers to spend more time with the individuals.

A multitude of experiences will be presented to each student, some remedial, but most, enriching. Challenges will be provided to stimulate the mind, and, perhaps more important, develop self - confi-


