Traditional Activities Spark Graduation

5 Honored In Who's Who

Five members of the Class of 1967 have been approved by the principal and faculty for inclusion in the newly-initiated "Who's Who" for high school graduates.

Sophie Straksys, John Filipkowski, Evelyn Dillon, Casey Sobczak and Chuck Bender rated among the top 3% of the nation's seniors from 23,500 participating schools, making them eligible for membership in the Who's Who by the Merit Publishing Company.

The requirements for admission include either membership in the National Honor Society, a scholastic ranking in the top 10% of their class, leadership of major school, activities, or outstanding records in varsity athletic teams.

Chuck, Casey, Evelyn, Sophie, John, were sent letters of congratulations and they, in turn, had to send short autobiographies.

Copies of "Who's Who Among American High School Students," which will contain their names will be distributed to colleges, universities, leading corporations, and libraries throughout the United States.

Filipkowski, all for U. of D.; and a Special Education Grant to Evelyn Dillon, for Madonna.

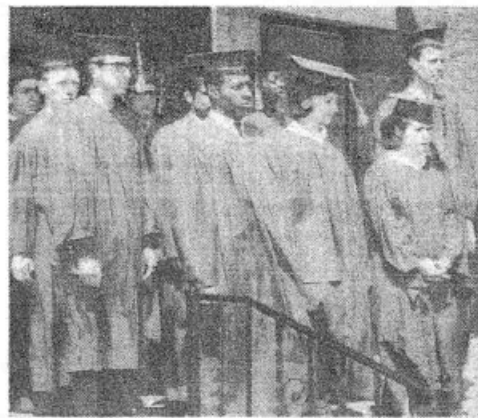

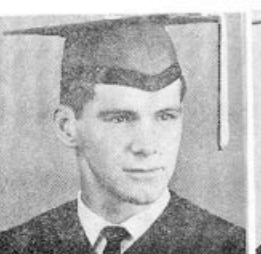

The Crescent "9" finished the '67 baseball season with a 6-3 record. St. Gabriel captured the Metro Division Title with a 7-2 record. One of their two defeats was suffered at the hands of the Crescents.

St. Casimir started off the season with two straight victories against St. Leo and Nativity. The Crescents lost the next two games against St. Martin, 6-0, and All Saints-7-4. A total of fourteen errors for the two games figured heavily in the defeat.

In their fifth game of the season, St. Casimir handed St. Gabriel its first defeat of the season in a 4-3 contest. John Shraga collected 3 RBI's to support Dennis Mullins' five hit pitching effort. Ray Campos scored the winning run on a passed ball.

The Crescents won their next game against Patronage by a score of 2-1. Both runs came in the second inning on John Shraga's triple. Dennis Mullins gained his second victory in four games. A tough 1-0 defeat by Annunciation left the Crescents with a 4-3 record.

Winning their last two games against St. Elizabeth and St. Cyril was not enough to give the Crescents a playoff berth with St. Gabriel. Dennis Mullins fanned 14 as the Crescents defeated St. Elizabeth 2-1 on two bases-loaded walks. John Shraga delivered a bases-loaded single to give the Crescents a 2-0 decision over St. Cyril. Ray Campos pitched a 2 hitter in the final game of the season.

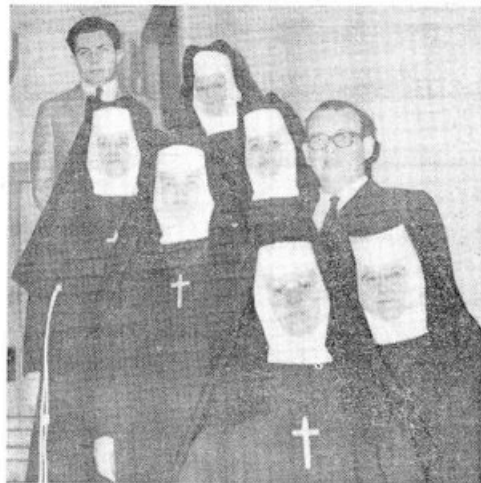
