Ranking fourth in scholastic standing is John Gruchala with a 3.06 average. John plans to attend Michigan State University to pursue an engineering career.



Senior Sportsmen Recall Records

As the countdown of days and minutes to graduation nears the zero hour, we pause to recognize our senior athletes.

John Shruga has been a sta'wart player for the Crescents since his freshman year, when he played reserve basketball. John also played for the reserves in his sophomore year. In his junior and senior years John played for the varsity.

Although he has played basketball, John insists that baseball is his real favorite. John's proudest memory in baseball was playing right-field for the Metro-Champion Crescents as a sophomore. That season John batted 222 and the following season led the Crescents in the RBI department as they finished in second place. John also received an honorable mention ALL-CITY last year.

Philip Kozian is a real work horse. Throughout his high school athletic career Phil has rarely been absent from practices or games. In his freshman and sophomore years Phil played junior varsity basketball. As a junior and senior Phil was a guard for the varsity.

Phil co-captained the basketball team and played first base on the Crescent baseball squad as a senior.

Long arms and legs made Dave Hatch a valuable man on the Crescent basketball teams for 4 years. At 6'4", he was the tallest man on the squad. Dave's rebounding was solely needed by the Crescents and his finest plays came in that capacity. Dave averages 6 pts. a game; his highest out point in a single contest was 18 pts.

Tom Koscielny is the kind of guy who started playing sports as soon as he learned to walk. At the age of six he joined the Boy's Club and played a variety of sports.

Short Henry Roth suddenly scrouted in his junior year to become, big, long Henry. Beginning in his sophomore year, Henry played two years on the reserves. In his senior year Henry played on varsity as a guard. His high game totals included 17 pts. against St. Vincent, and 18 pts. against St. Stanislaus.
